

## GERMAN 2

### Course Description

German 2 is designed for intermediate German learners. The successful student will improve their proficiency in German from imitative to reflective to interactive by engaging in a variety of communicative activities that focus on developing speaking, listening, reading and writing skills in the German language. In addition, the student will develop cultural awareness and become prepared to encounter real life situations outside of the classroom through discussions of cultural customs and behaviors.

### Course Objectives

Students who successfully complete the course will be able to do the following in German...

- recycle concepts from GER1- sein, haben, verb endings, stem changing verbs, words for THE, words for A, words for IT, adjectives, identifying people, vocab
- describe themselves and others using sein and haben
- talk about household chores and what they have to do at home
- talk about freetime activities and what they want to or would like to do at home
- command people to do things- informally (DU) and to a group (IHR)
- discuss what they can and should do in certain situations
- share what they did using the past perfect tense
- discuss what they do to live healthily and identify healthy/unhealthy foods
- tell how they are feeling using various illnesses and body parts
- use comparisons- especially to compare where they live to other places
- discuss various means of public transportation in Germany
- describe people and household objects using adjective endings after EIN words
- describe clothing using adjective endings after DER words



### Learning Outcomes

Students will complete...

- daily bell work including the Bible verse of the week every Monday
- in class communicative activities using the language to obtain and present information
- in class chapter packets organizing vocabulary and grammar
- in class video and audio activities
- in class writing activities
- around 3 written homework assignments per chapter
- an oral presentation for each chapter
- around 4 tests per semester
- The National German Exam

### Teaching Methods

The instructor will...

- elicit student responses in the target language
- present vocabulary through
  - Total Physical Response (TPR)
  - pictures and storytelling
  - textbook visuals and activities
  - video series and audio series
- present grammar through
  - lecture and note taking
  - textbook diagrams and activities
  - sentence writing
  - communicative activities

## Evaluation

Students will be graded on...

- Participation (25%)
  - *Students are expected to actively participate in class activities and speak the target language when asked. Each period is worth 5 points and each block is worth 10 points for a total of 25 points per week. Not having your book, chapter packet, or writing utensil with you will result in a slight loss of participation points that day. Not participating in class activities, not attempting to speak the target language when asked, and being disruptive will result in a major loss in participation points that day.*
- Homework (25%)
  - *There are three homework assignments per chapter, generally one or two homework assignments per week, depending on how the days fall. The homework consists of worksheets that practice the vocabulary and grammar from each chapter. These are essential for practicing writing and using the language on an individual basis.*
- Tests (25%)
  - *A test will be given at the end of every chapter that includes the following sections: listening, reading, writing, culture, vocabulary and grammar.*
- Oral Presentations and Compositions (25%)
  - *At the end of every chapter students will prepare an oral presentation. The two parts to this include: 1) writing a paragraph on a given topic before class, and 2) working with a partner in class to ask and answer questions about what you wrote. Students may also be asked to do in class writing or in class dialogues which would also fall in this category.*

*The final exam is worth 20% of the semester grade.*

*\*\*If we move to online learning only, be prepared to use Google Classroom to access lessons and assignments. In that case, the grading will be adjusted to 50% Participation (did you watch the videos and do the practice activities?) and the other 50% Accuracy (how accurate were you in the work you did?). There will be no tests and no written homework assignments given during online learning for Foreign Language. Any tests missed will be made up when we return to in person class and instead of written homework assignments we will do various online practice activities using Quizlet, Kahoot, Google Forms, Google Drawing, Google Slides and Google Docs\*\**

## Materials

Students will need a one inch three ringed binder with divider tabs and notebook paper for their Foreign Language Class. **German 2 needs 8 tabs for the year and should be labeled as follows: Kapitel 1, Kapitel 2, Kapitel 3, Kapitel 4, Kapitel 5, Kapitel 6, Kapitel 7, Kapitel 8.** Students are also required to bring the school provided textbook and writing utensils to class every day.

## National Exams

In the Spring all students in German levels 2, 3 and 4 will be taking the National German Exam. This exam is available through the American Association of Teachers of German (AATG) and will be taken during class. Students receive scores in two categories: Achievement (Vocabulary and Grammar) and Proficiency (Reading and Listening). Individual scores can be compared against local and national averages, and scholarships are also available for advanced level students who apply.

## Classroom policies

### 1) Absences and Tardies:

- Students are responsible for making up missed work and gathering missing notes and handouts. No matter the reason for your absence (illness, sports, family, vacation, etc) you will lose points for being absent UNLESS you inform me of your absence and ask for the work you missed (email works great for this- remember [emeier@lhskc.com](mailto:emeier@lhskc.com)). This year there is the option to participate from home via Zoom any day that you are sick- remember the link is at the top of the Google Classroom page.
- Students will be considered tardy if not in a desk in the classroom when the bell rings. The student will not be informed of the tardy; it will simply be noted on the participation sheet. *Unexcused tardies impact your grade so make sure you are getting a pass from the office or a teacher if there is a legitimate reason for your tardy.*

### 2) Homework:

- All homework is expected to be completed BEFORE class on the due date. Late work will be accepted, but will not be given full credit. Homework turned in late will have points taken off the total earned score. The amount of points taken off depends on how late the assignment is and what the reason is for the assignment being late. This is up to the discretion of the teacher.

### 3) Cheating and Plagiarism:

- All work submitted in this class is expected to be created solely by the student. Cheating and plagiarism will not be tolerated.
- If students are found to have copied another student's work, BOTH the student who copied the work and the student who allowed their work to be copied will receive a 0 and will not be allowed to re-do the assignment.
- Using online dictionaries is acceptable. I recommend [www.dict.leo.org](http://www.dict.leo.org). Dictionaries are to be used to solely look up individual words or two word phrases (i.e. tank top), however. Using Google translator or a native speaker to translate *entire sentences and/or paragraphs* of your assignment is considered plagiarism. Such work will be given a 0 and students must meet with the teacher to determine if the work can be redone or not.
- Don't even try it. Believe me, I will know when you have used an online translator and/or native speaker.

### 4) Electronics:

- Students are NOT allowed to use electronics (cell phones, smart phones, iPads, laptops, etc.) during class. *Cell phones must be kept in your backpack or locker OUT OF SIGHT at all times. Any phone that is seen during class or used in any way without permission will be confiscated. Checking the time and texting your parents are NOT acceptable reasons to use your cell phone.*
- Students are NOT to use ipads or laptops in class without explicit permission from the teacher. Permission will only be granted for academic reasons relating to what we are working on in class.
- Confiscated electronic devices will be given to the office where they can be retrieved for a fee of \$20 for the first offense and \$50 for the second offense.
